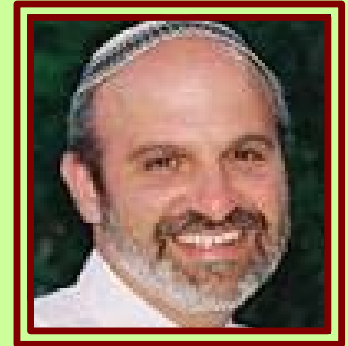

### *How should I feel the day after Yom Kippur?*

#### *Songs of Return*

The theme of “repentance” permeates the High Holiday season. Jews throughout the world are familiar with the concept, children learn about it in school, rabbis address it in their holiday sermons, and the prayers of the *machzor* reflect its centrality. Maybe we know what it means to “repent.” We might even be familiar with the steps, with the technical requirements associated with the “*teshuvah*” process. But do we know what it feels like? How should we feel as we commence the New Year, how should we feel the day after Yom Kippur?

Rabbi Morey Schwartz, our visiting presenter from Israel, will join us on the Sunday before Rosh Hashanah, and **spiritually guide us** toward some answers to this timely question. Come for an **inspiring** hour and a half of text study and song, during which we will **study**, investigate and then sing verses from the Bible and our liturgy that speak of *returning*...to God, to better days, to Israel. **New insights** into ancient texts will provide **contemporary relevance** for those who come in search of ways to make the High Holidays more **personally meaningful**.

**Rabbi Morey Schwartz** served as rabbi in Overland Park, Kansas, from 1991-2000. In June of 2000 he made aliyah, together with his family. Rabbi Schwartz is a graduate of Yeshiva University, with a Master's degree from the Bernard Revel Graduate School, and ordination from the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary. He currently serves as Curriculum Coordinator for the Florence Melton Adult Mini-School Institute, located in the Melton Centre at the Mount Scopus campus of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, where he is responsible for the ongoing maintenance of the curriculum of the Mini-School, soliciting director and faculty feedback and initiating ongoing discussions on the curriculum and its future development.

**Title- Introduction to Islam**

This course is an introduction to Islam as a prophetic religion in the Abrahamic tradition. We will explore the Islamic view of Abraham, Moses, Jesus, and Mary and the ways in which Moslems have interpreted the prophetic message of Mohammad.

The goal of this course is to help you better understand Islam's role as both a religion and a way of life, and its deep impact on world affairs both historically and contemporaneously. It is important to understand what Moslems believe, and also how their beliefs are carried out privately and publicly as individuals as well as members of a larger community.

**Title- The World's Oldest Thriller: The Five Books of Moses**

The Bible traces the people of Israel's development from one couple, Abraham and Sarah. Their relationship reveals the structure of Israel's ancestral family: a patriarchy in which decision-making authority rested in the hands of the father. The stories told about our ancestors also reveal the important role women and brothers could play in patriarchal families, and how they achieved their goals. In this course we'll discuss love, hate, family betrayal, adventure, murder, marriage, mid-life crises, dysfunctional families, broken promises, sex, lies and politics. All these and more. Here's your chance to find yourself, your family and your friends in these ancient pages. Together we will engage in our usual thorough analysis of texts and examine their implications for our own lives.

**Title- The First 1000 Years of Israeli Politics, Part 1**

The writings and speeches of Israel's founders, and of its subsequent leaders, identify the modern State of Israel with the biblical polity that existed 2500-3000 years ago. But what were the political challenges—and yes, there *were* political challenges—facing the kingdom of David and Solomon, and the rulers of its successor states, Judah and Israel? How did they cope with the issues faced by Israel today: taxes, military service, social and economic inequality, foreign policy, religious pluralism, the question of “who is a Jew” and of how to manage a multi-ethnic state in which not everyone was a Jew? This course will examine a variety of texts from the TaNaKh—Samuel, Kings, Chronicles and the *Neviim* (Prophets)—to reconstruct the political environment of ancient Israel during the first half of the first millennium of Israeli politics and how it relates to our world today.

**Title- The Joseph Narrative: Beyond the Coat of Many Colors**

The Joseph narrative, found in Genesis 37-50, is the closest thing to the structure of a literary novel we have in the Torah. On the surface, it's a story about the favored son of Jacob, an egotistical young man who engenders resentment and envy among his brothers. This is the *p'shat* (the simple meaning), but what is it really about? It's about a family who enables the realization of God's plan for the Jewish people. It's about the transition from a clan-based faith to the formation of a tribal heritage in preparation for becoming a national, and ultimately universal, religion. It's about exile, physically and spiritually. It's about finding the most unexpected sources of blessing in our lives, and so much more. As we study the men and women who appear in this artfully constructed biblical drama, we will discover universal truths that bridge the past and speak to us today.

The Siddur, the Jewish prayer book, is a repository of many diverse aspects of Jewish life and thought that have evolved through the ages. In this course, we will uncover, research, and analyze the historical and theological aspects of the Siddur, including the spiritual and philosophical concepts and ideas contained within.

This illuminating lecture series is designed to weave together past and present, ancient sacred texts and contemporary spiritual reflections from all the denominations. There will also be experiential and "hands on" presentations of the poetic genius of this, our most sacred text outside of the Torah itself. Knowledge of the Hebrew language is not required.

On the way we will look at why the idea blossomed, who embraced it and who rejected it. We'll meet Moses Hess, Theodor Herzl, Sir Moses Montefiore, David Ben-Gurion and all the others who contributed to the idea and its reality. We'll discuss and argue about Zionism's many successes and even some of its failures. Finally, we'll explore our own relationship to the Jewish State and take a stab at prophesying its future.

**Title- Such a Nice Jewish Boy: The Jewish View of Jesus**

Everyone knows that Jews “don’t believe in Jesus.” But what exactly don’t we believe in? His existence? His label as a prophet? A Messiah? The Son of God? All of the above? None of the above? The answers are far more complex than what you might think. In this course, we will examine the political, economic and religious climate before and during Jesus’ lifetime and explore what Jews expected of their prophets, their *mashiach*, and one called “son of God.” Through an analysis of texts in the Hebrew Bible and Gospels, we will try to understand how the Jewish *Mashiach* became a Christian *Messiah* and whether Jesus himself and his disciples expected this transition. The whole time, we will be looking to see what about Jesus (his life, his actions, his beliefs, his teachings, his death) would have been considered “Jewish” in his day and what wouldn’t. Join the Melton students who studied with Rabbi Zohar last fall as we focus this year on major episodes in Jesus’ life, the crucifixion controversy, and how Christianity became a separate religion. No prior subject knowledge necessary.

**Title- Women in the Bible: Prophets & Writings**

This course will delve more deeply into the concept of “Women in Judaism” first touched upon in Purposes by exploring our foundational text- the *TaNakh*. Students will be introduced to the major theoretical perspectives on Biblical women through the use of modern literary criticism and its tools in order to examine the plot, character development, and roles of selected women in Judges; I & II Samuel; I & II Kings; as well as the Book of Ruth. The goals of the course are to compare the socio-political position of women in ancient times to their position today, to uncover their contribution to our world, and to trace the development of stereotypes and paradigms used repeatedly in the Bible to describe women.

### **Title- Kabbalah in Action**

Study how the Kabbalists, through the concepts of the Sefirot and the Four Worlds, have brought mystical meaning and insight into our holidays, customs, life cycle ceremonies and rituals. One of our goals will be to study the Kabbalistic meanings that expand our awareness of many commonly experienced Jewish events and customs.

During the course we will particularly look at: the Wedding Ceremony, the Mezuzah, and the Shabbat Service. You will also acquire Kabbalistic gems about Pesach you can share with family and friends at the next Pesach Seder. Join the Melton students who studied with Rabbi Labowitz last spring and requested that he return this year and teach a different course for themselves and others. In addition, time willing, we will also study: Poetry in Prayer, Magic and Mitzvot.

### **Title- Wars Just and Unjust: Ancient and Contemporary Concepts**

This text-based course will explore the Jewish understanding of war and its limits from ancient Israel to Medieval Jewish Commentary. The topics will include: "The Biblical Call to Arms"; "The Talmudic Definitions: *Commanded, Obligatory* and *Optional War*"; and "Maimonides Provides a Detailed Summary". As counterpoint to the Judaic texts, the curriculum will consider the Catholic Concept of "The Just War" and the Islamic Imperative – *Jihad*. We will include Karl von Clausewitz of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century who asserts a philosophy of Nothing Less Than Victory; as well as the notion of "The Purity of Arms" and the Moral Warrior in the modern State of Israel. We will conclude with Modern Responses to Ancient Texts.

**Title- Archaeology of the Bible and the Land of Israel**

Can archaeology help us understand the Bible in a new light, and if so, how? The science of excavation and recovery has revolutionized our knowledge of the history of Israel, so the first class will examine the basic aims and methods of the practice of archaeology. We will then go on to explore how archaeological findings help us understand: the story of Abraham; the historicity of Joshua and the battle for Jericho; what Jerusalem was like during the first half of the first millennium BCE; the role of important cities such as Gezer, Hazor and Megiddo; the last days before the Babylonian conquest and exile; and what actually took place on Masada during the Great Revolt against the Rome. In addition, we will search for traces of the Temple as well as study its design against the background of other temples in the Near East.

**Title- Chassidism: Souls on Fire**

Historically, *Chassidut* (or Hassidism) is the single greatest populist movement in all of Jewish history. Within less than a century—from its birth in the early/mid-1700s to the early 1800s—*Chassidut* swept through Eastern Europe and introduced changes that are still being felt in every stream of Judaism today. In this course, we will trace the various historical events that led to the founding of the movement and what energized its rapid growth. We will learn about various Chassidic dynasties and their approaches to Jewish life as well as study various spiritual/ philosophical concerns through the lens of the great Chassidic masters. To fully understand the power of these ideas, we will be examining how *Chassidut* drew from Kabbalah and perhaps its most well-known product—the playful, yet deep, treasure trove of Chassidic stories and tales. Note: Melton students from Wednesday noontime last year loved this course so much it's being offered for evening students this year.

**Title: God Created a World Full of Little Worlds: Yiddish Culture Before the Holocaust**

*God created a world full of little worlds* (Yiddish proverb), and one of the greatest of these little worlds was the entire cultural civilization built around Yiddish language, literature and culture that blossomed throughout Europe, and to a lesser extent, in the Americas. Indeed, the world of Yiddish included many “little worlds” of its own: poetry and prose, theatre and film, journalism, literary criticism and comedy. In this course we will experience a bit of each of these Yiddish cultural expressions while we also study the history of Yiddish culture from the late 19<sup>th</sup> century through World War Two. No prior knowledge of Yiddish is necessary, although participants might discover that, to paraphrase Franz Kafka, they understand more Yiddish than they think.

**Title- Walking with God**

When we say the Shema, perhaps what we mean is: *Adonai*, our understanding of God, is ultimately a reflection of the *Ein Sof*, the One beyond all description. Based on a curriculum developed by the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies at the American Jewish University, in partnership with the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism and the Rabbinical Assembly, this course focuses on Jewish apprehensions of God throughout the ages and through diverse Jewish literatures (Bible, Talmud, Midrash, Halacha, Medieval Jewish Philosophy, Kabbalah, Hassidut and the Modern Era). During our study we will discover a wide range of insights and conceptualizations of the One who is beyond all words, beyond all conceptualizations, yet – paradoxically – who is as close as the human heart and who permeates all space and time.

This course does not require previous Melton study, though it does require **non-Melton students to attend an orientation to Melton and our learning program** at 6:30 before the first session.

Using the same extraordinarily successful method Paul Azaroff utilized with his Hebrew class this past year, Norma Uziel, a long-time day school teacher and highly recommended former colleague of Paul's, knows how to make learning to read Hebrew effective and fun (she's got a very upbeat, funny teaching style). This course is designed for people who don't know any Hebrew and its goal is to introduce the student to the Hebrew used in the prayer book (Siddur). By gaining a basic recognition of certain frequently used Hebrew roots, by the end of two semesters, you will be able to translate large sections of the *Siddur* and thus, understand the words we pray.

**Title- Such a Nice Jewish Boy: The Jewish View of Jesus**

Everyone knows that Jews "don't believe in Jesus." But what exactly don't Jews believe in? His existence? His label as a prophet? A Messiah? The Son of God? All of the above? None of the above? The answers are far more complex than what you might think. In this course, we will examine the political, economic and religious climate before and during Jesus' lifetime and explore what Jews expected of their prophets, their *mashiach* and one called "son of God." Through an analysis of texts in the Hebrew Bible and Gospels, we will try to understand how the Jewish *Mashiach* became a Christian *Messiah* and whether Jesus himself and his disciples expected this transition. The whole time, we will be looking to see what about Jesus (his life, his actions, his beliefs, his teachings, his death) would have been considered "Jewish" in his day and what wouldn't.

## 5768/2007-2008 GRADUATE FACULTY BIOGRAPHIES



**RABBI DAVID H. AUERBACH, D.D.**, received his undergraduate training at McGill University in Montreal, his Master's degree in Hebrew Literature, and ordination at The Jewish Theological Seminary of America. Before founding Bet Shira Congregation, he served pulpits in Montreal and Atlanta. David has served as National Chair of the Rabbinical Assembly Convention (1983-1985) and on the Assembly's Executive Council. He is a member of the National Rabbinic Cabinet of the United Jewish Appeal and has served as Co-Chair of Federation's Rabbinic Campaign. In 1977, he received the United Jerusalem Award, recognizing his communal leadership on behalf of State of Israel Bonds. In 1988, The Jewish Theological Seminary recognized his exemplary leadership in championing the principles of Conservative Judaism by presenting him with the Rabbinical Service Award of Appreciation. In May of 2000, the Seminary conferred on Rabbi Auerbach the Rabbi Simon Greenberg Rabbinic Achievement Award. Rabbi Auerbach is currently retired, but those who have taken classes with him previously admire his breadth of intellect, his command of Jewish sources, and his commitment to helping students appreciate our tradition in the contemporary world.



**PAUL AZAROFF, M.A.**, did his undergraduate work at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem in Sociology and Judaic Studies and earned a Masters degree in Education from the University of Toronto. In addition to some unconventional jobs—like serving as a shepherd on a kibbutz in Israel! — Paul has worked as a film officer for the National Film Board of Canada and as an instructor in the Media Resources Programme of Capilano College in British Columbia. A life-long educator, Paul has served as a Judaic Studies instructor at the Jacobson Sinai Academy and as Education Director of both Temple Sinai of North Dade and Temple Beth El in Hollywood. Currently retired, Paul sells Judaica on ebay and teaches part time, primarily for Melton. Paul grew up speaking Yiddish and has taken courses in Yiddish Studies for the past five summers in various locations around the world. “Yiddish is my passion and Yiddishkeit, my obsession,” Paul declares. With his encyclopedic knowledge, fantastic stories spanning several continents, and dynamic delivery, one student has called Paul: “The Google of Judaism!” For undergraduates, he teaches the Purposes and Dramas curricula at Temple Sinai Wednesday mornings, Purposes or Dramas at Sinai on Wednesday evenings, and Rhythms at our new Parent Track class on Thursday mornings.



**RABBI HASKELL M. BERNAT, D.D.**, received his undergraduate degrees from Columbia University and the Jewish Theological Seminary. He received ordination at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati, and was subsequently appointed to the faculty as a Teaching Fellow in Talmud, completing the fellowship at Brandeis University in Jewish Mysticism. During his four decades in the rabbinate, Haskell served as Senior Rabbi of congregations on the East and West coasts and was Director of the Commission on Worship of the Reform Movement. He has taught the History of Jewish Religion at the University of California- Riverside, and Rabbinic Hebrew and Liturgy at the Los Angeles campus of the Hebrew Union College. Not only does his dynamic teaching and wide-ranging erudition make for an inspired classroom, he also brings to Melton a unique background—an Orthodox Jewish upbringing and early education (where Yiddish was his first language) with a Reform Jewish outlook and breadth of scholarship, both Judaic and Western. At his present academic appointment, The Florida Center for Theological Studies, he instructs Christian Ministers and Rabbis who are candidates for the degree of Doctor of Ministry.



**RABBI MICAH CAPLAN, M.A.H.L.**, received his undergraduate degree in broadcasting (cum laude) from Arizona State University in Tempe, then went on to get his master’s degree in Rabbinic Literature at the University of Judaism, and was ordained at the Ziegler School of Rabbinic Studies at the University of Judaism in Los Angeles. While in LA he taught at the Ziegler School and in many area congregations. He now serves as the Rabbi of Bet Shira Congregation, where he has distinguished himself as a passionate teacher, a caring leader and keen advocate for Jewish learning and literacy.



**MARSHA B. COHEN, Ph.D. candidate**, did her undergraduate work at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem in Ancient, Medieval and Political Philosophy and has done her postgraduate work at Florida International University. She did her masters level work in Religious Studies and is currently a doctoral candidate in the Department of International Relations at FIU, where she teaches “International Relations of the Middle East.” Marsha has taught a wealth of Jewish adult education courses both nationally and internationally. She has presented papers at a variety of prestigious conferences such as LIMMUD in England and the Chautauqua Institute. Students never cease to be amazed by Marsha’s brilliant intellect, breadth of knowledge and winning classroom style. For the many years, she has been teaching the Ethics and Rhythms curricula as well as graduate courses at our South Dade campuses. ***Marsha Cohen is the first Melton faculty member to receive an endowed position and has been chosen to hold the Deborah and Michael Troner Endowed Faculty Chair.***



**RABBI JEFFREY L. FALICK, M.A.H.L.**, did his undergraduate work at the University of Texas at Austin and was ordained at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati. He has served as Hillel director at the University of Illinois and the University of Miami. Currently, Jeff is the Assistant Executive Director of the Dave and Mary Alper Jewish Community Center in Kendall. He has also served as the founding chair of the Jewish Professional Resource Organization of South Florida. Jeff is known for his energetic delivery, his command of Jewish texts and his passion for teaching. He possesses the rare ability to make even the driest subject or obscure historical era fascinating. His former South Dade students attested in their course evaluations: "Jeff made our subject come alive!" Jeff has two daughters, Aliza and Ilana, and lives on Miami Beach with his partner, Arthur.



**RABBI MARC LABOWITZ**, is a graduate of the Scottsdale Torah Institute and the Ateret Tzvi Academy, receiving his rabbinic ordination in 2004. Over the years, Marc has enjoyed many diverse experiences. After spending a high school preparatory year at Kfar HaYarok in Israel, he worked as a certified yoga teacher, a stress management and recovery specialist and as a fundraiser for GreenPeace. Currently he is the rabbi of Temple Adath Or, South Florida’s Center for Jewish Renewal. In addition to lecturing and keynoting at congregations, JCC’s and interfaith conferences around South Florida and Arizona, Marc teaches Kabbalah and Jewish mysticism on a regular basis in Broward. After experiencing Marc’s teaching style, Melton students commented: “He is so warm and connects so well with each student! Plus I learned things about spirituality and mysticism from him no other teacher has ever discussed before.” Marc comes from a long line of rabbis—including his great-grandfather and namesake, Rabbi Mordechai Rabinovitch of Baltimore z”l, grandfather Rabbi Herschel Leibowitz z”l, and parents, Rabbis Phil and Shoni Labowitz.



**PROFESSOR ERIK LARSON, Ph.D.**, did his undergraduate work at Syracuse University in Physics. He received his Masters degree from Bob Jones University in Biblical Studies, and his doctorate from NYU in Near Eastern Languages and Literatures. Presently, he is an Associate Professor of Religious Studies at Florida International University. In 1991, Erik was invited by both Professor Emanuel Tov, the Chief Editor of the Dead Sea Scrolls Project, and the Israel Antiquities Authority to join the international team of scholars editing the Dead Sea Scrolls and working on certain apocryphal texts from among the unpublished materials. At last count, Erik was fluent in

11 languages- four modern and seven ancient! His students admire his vast expertise, love his easy-going manner and his encouraging style of teaching. We are thrilled to be able to offer a class with him in North Dade this year.



**RABBI REBECCA LILLIAN, M.A.H.L.**, earned her B.A. in history and education from Hampshire College and completed the coursework toward a Ph.D. in history at the University of Massachusetts. During this time she fell in love with Yiddish language and literature. She received a certificate of advanced study from the Uriel Weinreich Yiddish Summer Program at YIVO/Columbia University, and has also found Yiddish a practical skill as she traveled in Russia and Eastern Europe. Rebecca was ordained at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College in Philadelphia, where she received her MA in Hebrew Literature. She has taught Yiddish and Jewish history courses at U-Mass

Amherst, Gratz College, and Tichon Ramah in Jerusalem. Rebecca moved to Miami in 2004 to serve as the rabbi of Temple Beth Or, the only Reconstructionist congregation in Miami-Dade County. Students enjoy her warmth, her intellectuality and her intensity. She finds it a true *mekhayeh* to be bringing her love of Yiddish culture to the Melton program.



**RABBI AKIVA D. MANN, M.A.**, received his Master's degree in education from Long Island University as well as an advanced teacher's degree in Hebrew and Judaic Studies and Ordination after graduating from Ner Israel Yeshivah of Toronto. While working as a congregational rabbi in Edmonton, Alberta, he also served as a lecturer for seven years at the University of Alberta in Jewish Philosophy and Mysticism. Akiva was blessed to be the Dean of the Denver Institute of Jewish Studies, a world-famous experiment that brought together Reform, Conservative, Reconstructionist and Orthodox congregations in offering communal adult education as well as joint courses

for conversion. Currently he is the spiritual leader of the Hallandale Jewish Center, where one of our Melton instructors, Paul Azaroff, chooses to attend every High Holy Days because he finds the worship services Akiva leads and the divrei Torah he offers to be "profoundly spiritual, meaningful, enlightening and always grounded in scholarship." In addition to his congregational work, he lectures and performs on his guitar throughout North America and Israel. Akiva's teaching is characterized by a comprehensive knowledge in classical Jewish texts mixed with a thoroughly modern perspective and an open, loving spirit.



**RABBI MOSHE ROTHCHILD**, earned his B.A. in Psychology from Yeshiva University as well as ordination. He spent three years studying in Israel at the Gruss Kollel and Yeshivat HaKotel. Moshe has taught at some of New York's most prestigious Jewish high schools, including the Ramaz School, and served as a Rabbi at the Manhattan Jewish Experience. He founded the Cooper Fellows Israel Program, Netivot Summer Experience and Jewish Encounters for Teens. **PROFESSOR DANIELLE SHARON, M.A.**, holds three Masters degrees—one from the University of Rome in Languages and Literatures and two from Barry University in English Literature and Judaic Studies. Until recently, she taught courses on a variety of Jewish subjects at area universities, such as the University of Miami and Florida International University. Danielle has created innovative interactive on-line and web-based courses in Biblical and Modern Hebrew among others, which she teaches through distance learning institutions like the Jewish Theological Seminary, the Hebrew College of Boston, and DAAT International. She has worked in Jewish education for many years and has mastered six languages. Students love Danielle’s passion for teaching, her remarkable skills in textual analysis, and her breadth of knowledge. **NORMA UZIEL**, is a graduate of New York University and is a dual citizen of the US and Israel. During her seven years living in Israel, she married, had her first child, and worked and studied in Kibbutz HaZorea in an Ulpan Program, She later moved to Jerusalem where she worked as an English editor at the Encyclopedia Judaica, the first English language Jewish encyclopedia published in Israel. Norma also worked as a scientific translator for the Department of Mathematics and Sciences of Hebrew University in Jerusalem. Presently, she teaches Hebrew at Temple B’nai Israel in Boca Raton and continues to use Hebrew as the primary language in her home. She taught Hebrew and Judaic subjects to children and adults at Temple Sinai, was a founding teacher of the Hebrew school at Aventura Turnberry, and is a graduate of our Miami Melton Program. She joined our Melton teaching staff as an instructor for the introductory Hebrew/*Siddur* class. Students report that she makes learning Hebrew fun and painless!



**RABBI EFRAT ZARREN-ZOHAR, M.A.**, did her undergraduate work in Political Science and Women’s Studies at the University of Michigan-Ann Arbor, working for one year as the Program Director at the University of Michigan Hillel following graduation. Efrat earned her Masters degree in Hebrew Literature from the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in New York, where she received ordination. During her graduate years, Efrat also spent an extra year of study at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem taking Judaic Studies courses in Hebrew and English. Following Rabbinical school, she served as the Assistant Rabbi at Temple Solel in Hollywood and, since 1993, as an executive staff member at the Center for the Advancement of Jewish Education (CAJE). 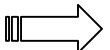
